During the quarter, Eden secured against Eden's three US properties, for the sum of US\$3.00 million from Snowpoint Northeast LLC. Interest at 11% pa, term of 18 months with option to extend for a further 6 months. For full further details please refer to the ASX announcement date 28 April 2020.

Eden US received a U.S. CARES Act SBA loan for US\$634,300.

Noble Energy Pty Ltd (a 100% subsidiary of Tasman Resources Ltd) provided Eden with an interest free, unsecured loan of A\$200,000 with no fixed term.

- Does the entity expect that it will continue to have the current level of net operating cash flows for the time being and, if not, why not?

Answer:

Eden is expecting a progressive increase in sales in the coming quarters due to growth in new customers and potential customers which should reduce the net operating cash flow required for operating activities.

- Has the entity taken any steps, or does it propose to take any steps, to raise further cash to fund its operations and, if so, what are those steps and how likely does it believe that they will be successful?

Answer:

Eden announced a Share Purchase Plan ("SPP") on 19 June 2020 to raise A\$5,000,000 through the issue of approximately 178,571,429 new fully paid ordinary shares at A\$0.028. The directors are highly confident at least A\$4,000,000 will be raised through the SPP.

Eden may also elect to raise further finance to supplement the amount raised under the SPP to assist in the funding of its short to medium term working capital requirements. Eden has been negotiating to enter into a financing arrangement with a third-party financier to provide it with access to an additional source of funding, should it be required for general working capital purposes, but there is no certainty that these negotiations will be successfully concluded and that this backstop financing facility completed.

3. Does the entity expect to be able to continue its operations and to meet its business objectives and, if so, on what basis?

Answer:

Yes the Company does expect to be able to continue its operations and to meet its business objectives, as a result of:

- a. the probability of increased sales of its products as evidenced by an increasing level of market interest in Eden's products, particularly in the USA; and
- b. the funding measures detailed above which together are expected will result in sufficient funds being raised when required to achieve the Company's business objectives.
