# Quarterly Activities Report and Appendix 4C

# Highlights:

- Significant improvement in FY20 EBITDA loss. EBITDA loss guidance to \$5.5-6.5 million, net loss after tax to \$7-8 million. Revenue guidance of \$56.1 million remains unchanged from previous<sup>1</sup>
- Despite COVID-19 uncertainty, 98% NRR<sup>2</sup> as customer retention remains strong, with lower customer churn as at 30 June 2020
- \$2.9 million in operating cash outflows for the three months ended 30 June 2020, ahead of expectations
- Strong cash position of \$28.4 million to fund organic growth initiatives and strategic acquisitions that complement the Limeade employee experience platform and contribute to CARR<sup>3</sup> growth

SYDNEY, Australia and Bellevue, Washington. – 31 July 2020 – <u>Limeade</u> (ASX: LME, or the Company), an employee experience software company, today announces a quarterly activities report and Appendix 4C quarterly cash flow report for the three months ended 30 June 2020.

Limeade CEO Henry Albrecht said "I am pleased with the resilience of our business despite COVID-19 impacting our core North American market and the broader world economy. Reflecting the quality of our platform in times of crisis, we have observed a significant increase in the utilisation of our employee experience solutions from existing customers, in the period 1 April to 30 June versus the prior corresponding period. Indeed, several of our largest enterprise customers consider Limeade a vital partner during this period of uncertainty."

Mr Albrecht continued "Our upgraded financial guidance provided today highlights our strong customer relationships and the adaptability of our business. Costs are lower than previously forecast due to lower sales and marketing costs associated with a reduction in travel, face-to-face marketing events and a slowdown in the rate of new hires consistent with COVID-19

restrictions and uncertainty. We are also observing *increases* in longer-term demand for solutions that empower more effective communication with increasingly remote and distributed global workforces; that support employees' physical, emotional and financial well-being; and that drives increased employee engagement, connection, safety and performance."

During the quarter, the Company recorded cash receipts from customers of \$17.3 million. Net cash receipts from customers after adjusting for payments made in relation to the sale of third-party products and services was \$10.5 million. Receipts from direct customers are typically higher in Q1 of each year due to the seasonality of annual payments, with a significant level of invoicing having occurred in Q4 2019 and Q1 2020. Third party payments of \$6.8 million were flat versus Q1 2020.

Cash payments during the quarter were primarily directed towards the following costs: staff (\$8.5 million), administration & corporate (\$2.8 million), operating (\$0.8 million), advertising & marketing (\$0.6 million) and research & development (\$0.3 million). Staff costs declined 32.9% over Q1 2020, reflecting the payment in the first quarter of staff bonuses earned in the prior financial year. Net operating cash outflow for the quarter was \$2.5 million (Q1 2020: +\$1.9 million), reflecting the timing effect of customer transitions to annual upfront subscription fees, which are typically collected in Q1 of each year.

Investing cash flows of -\$1.6 million reflect software development costs during the quarter.

During the quarter, the Company made related third-party payments of \$89,000 representing fees paid to non-executive directors for performance of their required duties as disclosed in the prospectus and annual report.

The Company's cash balance as at 30 June 2020 was \$28.4 million and the company remains debt free. Limeade is well positioned with cash and recurring subscription revenue from their customer base. Consistent with the first quarter, the Company has not experienced a material increase in customer terminations or non-renewals (i.e. churn) as a result of COVID-19, with Net Revenue Retention (NRR) at 98% as at 30 June 2020.

Despite COVID-19, total sales and marketing pipeline at Q2 2020 remains consistent with the total pipeline at Q1 2020.

Limeade has experienced some delays in finalizing contracts, reflecting customer uncertainty related to enterprise budgets and timing due to COVID-19. Despite these delays, Limeade does expect to finalize a high percentage of current contracts under negotiation. During the quarter, Limeade signed an additional 2 new contracts (Q1 2020: 5), representing growth in the EU of Engagement solution offerings. Overall, Limeade expects an increase in the signing of customer contracts in the second half of the calendar year, with most services launching the following year, consistent with prior years.

Limeade continues to carefully monitor its expenditures, while making selective strategic investments that meet increased long-term demand.

In June, Limeade announced that industry leader Martin Zelger was appointed as Vice President (VP) of International Sales, headquartered in Zurich, Switzerland. Martin was formerly a Senior Vice President, International at Virgin Pulse and will be responsible for all EU direct sales for Limeade, a key growth driver for the company. He will focus on expanding the footprint of the pioneering Well-Being and award-winning Engagement solutions.

Additionally, in April Larry Colagiovanni was hired as VP of Research & Development. Larry was previously at eBay as their VP, Marketing Technology & Platform Product and General Manager, eBay Seattle. Larry will focus on the expansion of the Limeade platform and solutions. The Company's headcount at the end of Q2 was up nearly 7% to 275 versus 258 as at 31 December 2019.

In April, Limeade was proud to deliver "Care in Crisis" solutions to over 200,000 people in North America – at no cost – to help populations struggling in the face of COVID-19.

Limeade is committed to a growth strategy focused on providing solutions to large enterprise employers globally that contribute to a positive employee experience. The Company continues to evaluate market opportunities and remains open and well positioned to pursue strategic, technologically aligned and culturally compatible acquisitions to accelerate growth.

Based on a review of the first half performance, and expectations for the second half, Limeade today has provided updated financial guidance for FY20:

- Revenue of \$56.1 million (unchanged from previous)
- Earnings Before Interest, Tax, Depreciation and Amortization (EBITDA) loss of \$5.5-\$6.5 million (previous guidance: EBITDA loss of \$10.7 million)
- Net loss after tax of \$7-8 million (previous guidance: Net loss after tax of \$12.4 million)

Limeade has provided investors a snapshot on the use of funds as stated in the IPO prospectus during the quarter in the table shown in Appendix 1.
