## OK Mine Drilling Program Complete with High Grade Results

<u>Pantoro Limited</u> (**ASX:PNR**) (**Pantoro**) is pleased to provide a further update on results from its maiden underground drilling program at the high grade OK Underground Mine at the Norseman Gold Project (PNR 50%).

### **Key Highlights**

The diamond drilling program at the OK Underground Mine has now been completed, with approximately 14,000 metres drilled. The objective of the program was to extend the depth of defined mineralisation in the O2 lode below the 22 Level, and to infill the Star of Erin Lode mineralisation.

**Star of Erin Lode** – Drilling in the Star of Erin Lode in the upper areas of the mine has returned a number of wide, high grade results, confirming a second ore zone immediately available for mining at OK. New results include:

- 3.35 m @ 29.84 g/t Au.
- 2.4 m @ 14.58 g/t Au.
- 2.05 m @ 19.23 g/t Au.
- 0.55 m @ 22.6 g/t Au.
- 1.1 m @ 17.12 g/t Au.
  - 3.2 m @ 6.3 g/t Au including 1.1 m @ 16.33 g/t Au.
- 1.3 m @ 6.45 g/t Au.
- 0.35 m @ 31.90 g/t Au.

**O2 Lode** – New drill results from the O2 Lode have been received in addition to the high grade results previously reported. New results include:

- ✓ 5.7 m @ 27.18 g/t Au including 1 m @ 57.6 g/t Au and 1.5 m @ 61.13 g/t Au.
- 1.9 m @ 6.72 g/t Au.
- 3.8 m @ 6.02 g/t Au.
- 0.5 m @ 18.30 g/t Au.
- 1.7 m @ 6.58 g/t Au including 0.7 m @ 14.58 g/t Au.

Commenting on the results, Managing Director Paul Cmrlec said:

"The results from the Star of Erin Lode at the OK Underground Mine have confirmed consistent high grades which give us confidence that the mine will have at least two primary ore sources from commencement of operations. The revised Mineral Resource Estimate and Ore Reserve calculation are being prepared for release with the Definitive Feasibility Study for the Norseman Gold Project which is nearing completion. The OK Underground Mine is yet another example of the high quality projects available for near term recommencement of production at Norseman."

#### **OK Diamond Drilling Program**

Pantoro has completed its initial drilling programs at the OK Underground Mine with excellent results returned from both depth extensions in the O2 Lode and from infill drilling in the central zones of the O2 Lode.




Figure 1: The OK Underground Mine showing Star of Erin, Main and O2 Lodes.

The drilling program beneath the historic workings in the O2 Lode has covered a large proportion of the approximately 600 metres of strike. Drilling has consistently returned high grade assays throughout the zones tested, providing Pantoro with the confidence required to recommence development in the area. New results from the O2 Lode follow on from high grade results released to the ASX on 16 June 2020 (refer ASX Announcement 'High Grade Results Continue from OK Underground Mine') and 17 April 2020 (refer ASX Announcement 'High Grade Results from OK Underground Mine Drilling').

### New results include:

- 5.7 m @ 27.18 g/t Au including 1 m @ 57.6 g/t Au and 1.5 m @ 61.13 g/t Au.
  - 1.9 m @ 6.72 g/t Au.
  - 3.8 m @ 6.02 g/t Au.
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


Figure 2: Long Section of O2 Lode

Drilling within the O2 Lode has been undertaken from the base of the existing decline, which has been fully rehabilitated by previous owners, requiring only minor capital for the recommencement of development. The mine is relatively dry, and only the bottom two existing levels of the mine require dewatering.

The Star of Erin Lode was drilled from the surface box cut, infilling the limited drilling in the central zone of the orebody. Drilling has confirmed continuous high grade mineralisation over a strike length of approximately 420 metres in the upper levels of the mine, which can be easily accessed from existing decline infrastructure. Results returned from the zone include:




Figure 3: Long Section of Star of Erin

Drilling at Star of Erin has returned numerous intervals with visible gold noted, characteristic of mineralisation seen in other ore zones historically mined at Norseman.

The results from both the O2 and Star of Erin diamond drill programs are being used to finalise the Mineral Resource Estimate and Ore Reserve calculation to be reported as part of the Definitive Feasibility Study for the Norseman Gold Project.

### **About the OK Underground Mine**

The OK Underground Mine is located approximately two kilometres south of the Phoenix processing plant. The mined reefs strike predominantly to the east and are sub vertical. The OK Underground Mine was originally worked in the 1930s, but lay idle until 1980 when the shaft was re-opened by Central Norseman Gold Corporation to mine remnant ore from the OK Main reef. Underground drilling of the east striking tensional Main reef led to the discovery of the NW striking O2 reef.

The Star of Erin Lode was defined more recently, with shear hosted veins. The gold in the O2 reef is free milling and typically hosted by a very narrow (0.3 metres average width) laminated quartz vein which is commonly surrounded by a selvage of up to 2 metres wide of predominantly biotite alteration. The OK reefs are among the most nuggety at Norseman. The mine has produced historically at an average grade of 9.1 g/t Au

The Indicated and Inferred Mineral Resource at OK and Star of Erin currently stands at 355,000 tonnes @ 18.0 g/t for 205,000 ounces with excellent scope for growth through further drilling.

#### **About the Norseman Gold Project (Pantoro 50%)**

Pantoro Limited announced the major acquisition of 50% of the Norseman Gold Project in May 2019 and completion occurred on 9 July 2019. Pantoro is the manager of the unincorporated joint venture, and is responsible for defining and implementing work programs, and the day to day management of the operation.

The Norseman Gold Project is located in the Eastern Goldfields of Western Australia, at the southern end of the highly productive Norseman-Wiluna greenstone belt. The project lies approximately 725 km east of Perth, 200 km south of Kalgoorlie, and 200 km north of Esperance.

The current Mineral Resource is 4.4 million ounces of gold (100% basis). Many of the Mineral Resources defined to date remain open along strike and at depth, and many of the Mineral Resources have only been tested to shallow depths. Mineral Resources have been estimated by Independent Expert HGS Australia Exploration Services. Pantoro is systematically drilling Mineral Resource areas and updating Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves as additional data becomes available. In addition, there are numerous anomalies and mineralisation occurrences which are yet to be tested adequately to be placed into Mineral Resources, with a number of highly prospective targets already identified by drilling.

The project comprises 146 near-contiguous mining tenements, most of which are pre-1994 Mining Leases. The tenure extends approximately 70 lineal kilometres of the highly prospective Norseman–Wiluna greenstone belt covering more than 1,000 square kilometres. Pantoro is focused on establishing a clear production development plan, and execution of that plan. The aim will be to initially establish an initial inventory of ~500,000 ounces to support a restart of operations.

Historically, the Norseman Gold Project areas have produced over 5.5 million ounces of gold since operations began in 1935, and is one of, if not the highest grade fields within the Yilgarn Craton. Pantoro is focused on establishing a clear production development plan, and has commenced drilling and other works required to convert Mineral Resources to Ore Reserves.

Pantoro has focused Mineral Resource definition drilling on six initial mining areas containing multiple deposits which are amenable to both open pit and underground mining.

The initial drill out of these first areas is nearing completion, Mineral Resource modelling is underway and due for completion in the September quarter.

The project is serviced by first class infrastructure at the project, local shire, and national infrastructure levels with MACA Interquip appointed to oversee the processing aspects of the feasibility study.
