### **Monthly Appendix 4C – July 2021**

Further to ASX's request, and pursuant to listing rules 18.7 and 18.8, that Oliver's Real Food Limited ("OLI" or the "Company") lodge a monthly report in the form of an Appendix 4C under listing rule 4.7B, commencing with an Appendix 4C for July, the Company provides Appendix 4C for the month ending 31 July 2021.

The Company's material business activities for July 2021 included:

- Company-store sales \$713K, down 73.91% on **2019 sales**
- State performance compared with **2019**: NSW down 88.04%, VIC down 55.25%, QLD down 9.98%
- Lockdowns in NSW and Victoria impacted store performance, with many stores temporarily closed due to travel restrictions.
- Ongoing NSW lockdown and travel restrictions along with Victoria's 6.0 lockdown are significantly impacting August revenue.
- Oliver's Food to Go sales were \$314K, and six more EG service stations were added, bringing the total service stations to 159 as of July 2021.
- Food To Go Sales have also been impacted by the lockdowns and travel restrictions, and this continues in August

The Company comments that Appendix 4C represents the movement of cash during the month. Therefore, receipts from customers (1.1) includes reduction in Accounts Receivable balances (\$316K) and payments for product manufacturing and operating costs (1.2(b)) as well as a reduction in Accounts Payable balances (\$811K) during the month.

8.6.1 Does the entity expect that it will continue to have the current level of net operating cash flows for the time being and, if not, why not?	
Answer: This is totally dependant on lockdowns, which once eased will have a significant positive impact on cash flow. Additionally, Job Saver payroll subsidy, rent waivers, significantly lower wage costs will have a positive impact on net operating cashflow.	
8.6.2 Has the entity taken any steps, or does it propose to take any steps, to raise further cash to fund its operations and, if so, what are those steps and how likely does it believe that they will be successful?	
Answer: OLI is currently in discussions with its primary financier, PURE Asset Management and major shareholders and is considering a range of options to fund the business over the coming months. The Company had previously advised the market of our intention to raise capital via a Share Purchase Plan (SPP) to shareholders at 3 cents but due to the ASX suspension of OLI shares the Company currently believes an SPP equity raise would be unlikely to garner retail shareholder support. The Company remains of the view that the current discussions will achieve a successful outcome and will make an announcement once agreement is reached.	

**8.6.3** Does the entity expect to be able to continue its operations and to meet its business objectives and, if so, on what basis?

Answer: Yes, as a result of the restructure, annualised costs of approximately \$4M have been stripped from the business and revenue is forecast to improve as Australia moves to ease lockdowns following a massive surge in vaccination rates.
