2026 Corporate Governance Statement

The Board of Neurizon Therapeutics Limited (**Neurizon** or the **Company** or the **Group**) is responsible for the overall corporate governance of the Company. The Board believes that good corporate governance helps to ensure the future success of the Company, adds value to stakeholders and enhances investor confidence.

The ASX Listing Rules require listed companies to prepare a statement disclosing the extent to which they have complied with the recommendations of the ASX Corporate Governance Council (**Recommendations**) during the reporting period. The Recommendations are not prescriptive, such that if a company considers a recommendation to be inappropriate having regard to its own circumstances, it has the flexibility not to follow it. Where a company has not followed all the Recommendations, it must identify which Recommendations have not been followed and provide reasons for not following them.

This Corporate Governance Statement (**Statement**) discloses the extent to which the Company has followed the Recommendations, or where appropriate, indicates a departure from the Recommendations with an explanation. PRINCIPLE 1: LAY SOLID FOUNDATIONS FOR MANAGEMENT AND OVERSIGHT

Recommendation 1.1 - Role of the Board and Management

The role of the Board is to provide overall strategic guidance and effective oversight of management.

The Company has adopted a Board Charter which is available on our website at <https://investorhub.neurizon.com/governance>.

The Board Charter sets out matters including the specific roles and responsibilities of the Board and management, requirements as to the Board's composition, the roles and responsibilities of the Chair and Company Secretary, and the establishment, operation and management of Board Committees.

The Board delegates responsibility for the day-to-day management of the Company and its business to the Chief Executive Officer (**CEO**) / Interim Executive Chair (as applicable). The Board maintains ultimate responsibility for strategy, control and risk profile of the Group.

Recommendation 1.2: Appointment of Directors

The Company undertakes checks on any person who is being considered as a director. These checks may include good fame and character, experience, education and financial history and background.

All material information relevant to a decision on whether or not to elect or re-elect a Director is provided to security holders in a Notice of Meeting pursuant to which the resolution to elect or re-elect a Director will be voted on.

Recommendation 1.3: Appointment Terms

The Company's Board Charter requires that the terms and conditions of appointment of a Director be confirmed in a formal letter of appointment or a service contract.

Specifically:

- the Non-Executive Directors have each executed a letter of appointment setting out the terms and conditions of their appointment; and
- Senior Executives of the Company have entered into service contracts, setting out the terms and conditions of their employment.

The terms and conditions of the appointment are consistent with the processes in the Constitution, the *Corporations Act 2001* (Cth) and the ASX Listing Rules, including, without limitation, the requirement to disclose Directors' interests and any matters which may affect the Director's independence and the requirement to comply with the Company's policies.

Each Director and officer of the Company has a Deed of Access, Insurance and Indemnity, under which they are indemnified against liability in connection with their role as an officer of the Company and Neurizon is required to maintain a Directors' and officers' insurance policy.

A summary of key terms of the service agreements and letters of appointment are disclosed in the Remuneration Report section of the Company's Annual Report.

Recommendation 1.4: Company Secretary

The Board is supported by the Company Secretary, whose role includes supporting the Board on governance matters, assisting the Board with meetings and Directors' duties, and acting as an interface between the Board and Senior Executives across the Group.

The Company Secretary is accountable directly to the Board, through the Chair, on all matters to do with the proper functioning of the Board.

Details regarding our Company Secretary, including experience and qualifications, are set out in the Directors' Report in our 2026 Annual Report.

Recommendation 1.5: Diversity Policy

The Company's workforce, including employees, contractors, management and the Board, is made up of individuals with diverse skills, values, backgrounds and experiences that bring to the Company the skills and expertise that are required for the Company to enhance its performance.

The Company values diversity and recognises the benefit it can bring in achieving the Company's goals. To this end, the Company has a Diversity Policy Charter that reflects its commitments and objectives, and includes requirements for the Board to annually review performance against these objectives, as part of its annual performance assessment.

Senior Executives are defined as roles supporting the Managing Director with running the business and delivering on strategic objectives.

The Company has set key principles in relation to Diversity and Inclusion, including Equal Opportunity, Inclusive Culture and Fair Treatment. The Company is committed to ensuring that the appropriate mix of skills, experience, expertise and diversity are considered when employing staff at all levels of the organisation, and when making new Senior Executive and Board appointments, and is satisfied that the composition of employees, Senior Executives and Board members is appropriate considering its size and environment. The Board will continue to monitor Neurizon growth and needs for specific gender diversity targets periodically.

Recommendation 1.6: Board, Committees and Individual Directors Performance Assessment

Individual Directors' performance is also assessed through open and frank discussions between the Chair of Board. Similarly, evaluation results for the Chair are provided to the Board for discussion.

The performance assessment for FY2026 commenced in June 2026 in accordance with the above process, with the results of the performance review to be presented and discussed at the next suitable Board meeting.

Recommendation 1.7: Senior Executive Performance Assessment

The Board is committed to evaluating the performance of the Senior Executives. In accordance with the Company's Board Charter, each year the Board will oversee the performance evaluation of the executive team, including the MD and/or CEO, and disclose whether the performance evaluation of the executive team has been undertaken for that year. This evaluation is based on specific criteria, including the business performance of the Company and its subsidiaries, whether strategic objectives are being achieved and the development of management and personnel.

Senior Executives are appointed by the Chief Executive Officer / Board (as applicable) and their Key Performance Indicators (KPI's) contain specific financial and non-financial objectives. These KPI's are reviewed annually by the CEO/Board. The performance of each Senior Executive against these objectives is evaluated annually.

Until then the Board carries out the duties that would ordinarily be assigned to the Nomination Committee under the written terms of reference for the Committee.

Recommendation 2.2: Board Skills Matrix

Our objective is to have an appropriate mix of expertise and experience on our Board so that it can effectively discharge its corporate governance and oversight responsibilities. It is the Board's view that the current Directors possess an appropriate mix of relevant skills, experience, expertise and diversity to enable the Board to discharge its responsibilities and deliver the Company's strategic objectives. This mix is subject to review on a regular basis as part of the Board's performance review process. The Board continuously monitors and assesses its requirements, determining whether and when any additional Board appointments are required.

The Board regularly assesses the independence of each Non-Executive Director in light of the information which each Director is required to disclose in relation to any material contract or other relationship with the Company in accordance with the Director's terms of appointment, the Corporations Act 2001, and the Board Charter.

When appointing an Independent Director or reviewing the independence of its Directors, the Board will have regard to the definition of independent director and the factors set out in the Recommendations, in particular the factors relevant to assessing the independence of a director set out in Recommendation 2.3.

*On 16 March 2026, Mr. Duchini was appointed as Interim Executive Chair following Dr. Thurn stepping down from his role as Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer of the Company. The Board considers that whilst Mr. Duchini is serving as Interim Executive Chair in a management capacity, he is not currently deemed independent. It is intended that Mr. Duchini will revert to Non-Executive Chair once a suitable CEO is appointed.

The Board considers Mr. Hughes, Dr. MacFarlane and Dr. Murdoch to be independent having regard to the indicia in Box 2.3 in the ASX Recommendations. The Board has considered the holdings of shares and unlisted options in the Company by these Non-Executive Directors and is of the opinion that their respective interests in shares and unlisted options would not materially interfere with, or could be reasonably perceived to interfere with, the independent exercise of their judgement in their position as a Director. The Board also considers that they are otherwise free from any business or other relationship that could materially interfere with, or reasonably be perceived to interfere with, the independent exercise of their judgement, and that each of these Directors is able to fulfil the role of independent Director for the purposes of the ASX Recommendations.

It is further noted that Mr. Hughes was appointed as Lead Independent Director, whilst Mr. Duchini is undertaking the role of Interim Executive Chair.

Recommendation 2.4: Majority Independence

As at the date of this Statement, three of our four Directors are deemed independent and the Company has a majority independent Board and complies with this Recommendation 2.4.

Further information regarding our Directors', including their experience and qualifications, is set out in the Directors' Report of our 2026 Annual Report.

Recommendation 2.5: Board Chair

The Chair, Mr. Sergio Duchini was appointed to the position on 17 May 2024 and is currently not considered an Independent Director on the basis that is he currently serving as Interim Executive Chair in a management capacity. The Chair provides leadership to the Board in relation to all Board matters and is responsible for ensuring that the Board meets its responsibilities under the Board Charter. His role is set out in more detail in the Board Charter.

During the majority of the reporting period the roles of Chair and Managing Director/Chief Executive Officer were exercised by different individuals, being Mr. Sergio Duchini and Dr. Michael Thurn, respectively. On 16 March

2026, Mr. Duchini was appointed as Interim Executive Chair following Dr. Thurn stepping down from his role as Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer of the Company.

Recommendation 2.6: Induction, Education and Training

All new Directors are provided with an induction including comprehensive meetings with the Chairman, and provision of information on the Company including Company and Board policies. All Directors are expected to maintain the skills required to effectively discharge their obligations to the Company. Directors are encouraged to undertake continuing professional education and, if this involves industry seminars and approved education courses, where appropriate, this is paid for by the Company.

The full Board oversees the induction program for new Directors and considers the training and development needs of all Directors. The Board is responsible for ensuring that resources are allocated to developing and maintaining the Directors' skills and knowledge, to ensure that the Directors have and maintain the necessary skills and knowledge required to fulfil their role on the Board and its Committees (if applicable) effectively.

PRINCIPLE 3 – ACT ETHICALLY AND RESPONSIBLY

Recommendation 3.1: Statement of Values

Neurizon's values are the guiding principles and norms that define what type of organisation it aspires to be and what it requires from its directors. The Company's Board of Directors, management and employees are dedicated to high ethical standards and recognise and support the Company's commitment to compliance with these standards.

The policy sets out, amongst other things, instances of suspected misconduct which can be reported to the internal and external parties and summarises the protections offered to whistleblowers.

Any material breach of the Company's policies, including any breach of the Whistleblower Policy, is raised, and reviewed at the Board Meeting.

The Board devotes time annually to fulfilling the roles and responsibilities associated with maintaining the Company's internal audit function and arrangements with external auditors. All members of the Board are involved in the Company's audit function to ensure the proper maintenance of the entity and the integrity of all financial reporting.

Recommendation 4.2: Assurances

The Neurizon Board has implemented a process to receive written assurances from its Interim Executive Chair or CEO (as applicable) and Chief Financial Officer (**CFO**) the declarations provided under section 295A of the Corporations Act are founded on a system of risk management and internal controls and the system is operating in all material respects in relation to financial reporting risks. The Board seeks these assurances prior to approving the financial statements for all half year, full year and quarterly results that follow.

Recommendation 4.3: Verification of integrity of periodic corporate reports

Our external auditor, RSM Australia Partners attends our AGM and a representative is available to answer

shareholder questions about the conduct of the audit and the preparation and content of the auditor's report.

RSM Australia Partners independence declaration is contained in the Directors' Report in our 2026 Annual Report.

The effectiveness, performance and independence of the external auditor is reviewed annually by the Board.

Any periodic corporate report the Company releases to the market that is not audited or reviewed by an external auditor is reviewed and approved by the Board so that it is satisfied the report in question is materially correct, balanced and provides investors with appropriate information to make an informed investment decision. Following review by the Board of Directors the report is formally approved prior to release.

PRINCIPLE 5 – MAKE TIMELY AND BALANCED DISCLOSURE

Recommendation 5.1: Continuous Disclosure Policy

PRINCIPLE 7 – RECOGNISE AND MANAGE RISK

Recommendation 7.1: Risk Committee

The Board is not currently operating a Risk Committee as of the date of this Statement. The full Board currently fulfills the function of the Risk Committee with full Board participation.

The Board periodically reviews whether it has the appropriate balance of skills, knowledge, and experience.

Given the recent changes to the Board, the Company is currently reviewing the merits of re-establishing a formal Risk Committee, which it anticipates will be re-established during FY27. Until then the Board carries out the duties that would ordinarily be assigned to the Risk Committee under the written terms of reference for the Committee.

The Board devotes time annually to fulfilling the roles and responsibilities associated with overseeing risk and maintaining the entities risk management framework and associated internal compliance and control procedures.

Recommendation 7.2: Review of Risk Management Framework

The Company's risk management framework is supported by the Board of Directors and management team. The Board is responsible for approving and reviewing the Company's risk management framework. Management is responsible for monitoring that appropriate processes and controls are in place to effectively and efficiently manage risk.

The Board continually monitors the Company's risk management framework. A full review of the risk management framework is intended to be undertaken during FY2027.

The Company does not meet this recommendation in its entirety.

Recommendation 7.3: Internal Audit

The Company did not have an internal audit function for the past financial year. Due to the size of the Company, the Board does not consider it necessary to have an internal audit function.

The Board monitors the need for an internal audit function having regard to the size, location and complexity of the Company's operations. The Board will periodically conduct an internal review of financial systems and recommended processes and systems are developed where they are considered to require improvement. If in future an internal audit function is warranted then the Board will give due regard to the ASX Recommendation and the establishment of an internal audit function.

The Company does not meet this Recommendation in its entirety.

Recommendation 7.4: Economic, Environmental and Social Sustainability Risk

The Company is not subject to any particular or significant single economic, environmental and social risk. The Company is subject to a range of general economic risks, including macro-economic risks, government policy, general business conditions, changes in technology and many other factors.

Until then the Board carries out the duties that would ordinarily be assigned to the Remuneration Committee under the written terms of reference for the Committee.

The Board devotes time annually to fulfilling the roles and responsibilities associated with setting the level and composition of remuneration for directors and senior executives and ensuring that such remuneration is appropriate and not excessive.

Recommendation 8.2: Remuneration Policies and Practices

The Board is currently responsible for determining and reviewing remuneration policies for the Directors and senior executives. If necessary, it obtains independent advice on the appropriateness of remuneration packages given trends in comparable companies and in accordance with the objectives of the Company.

Details of the Company's remuneration practices for its Directors and senior executives are disclosed in the Remuneration Report in the Company's Annual Report. The Remuneration Report highlights the balance between fixed pay, short term incentive and long-term incentives, and includes details of the remuneration paid and the relationship to the Company's performance.
